"If the Government is serious about improving experiences for patients, it needs to listen to those of us who dedicate our working lives to looking after them in increasingly difficult circumstances.

"We've lost the equivalent of more than 2,000 full-time, fully qualified GPs in England since this Government first promised 5,000 more in 2015; this should be a mark of shame for ministers.

"Messages like the one sent by Mr Barclay will only push more GPs towards the exit door and leave more patients struggling to see a family doctor."





There are now less than 41 GPs per 100,000 people in Leicestershire, Leicester, and Rutland, down from a national average of 52 in 2015.

The ratio to provide a safe service is 56 GPs per 100,000 people.

This effectively leaves over 315,000 patients without a safe service.

GPs are trying their best to keep up with ever increasing need for appointments with fewer resources.



there are over 2,070 fewer GPs in England than there were in 2015.


470 GPs left since last year








