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REGIONAL:

A. SEASONAL FLU VACCINES 2019/20

LLR LMC has received several queries relating to seasonal flu vaccines for 2019/20. Following guidance from the LMC Buying Group they have confirmed they will be working with all four remaining flu vaccine companies for the 2019/20 season to ensure they are in a position to help members no matter which supplier they decide to use next year.

GSK and Pfizer will not be producing flu vaccines for the UK market for 2019/20 which leaves MASTA, Mylan, Sanofi and Seqirus.

The Buying Group has negotiated discounts on all vaccines that are currently available to order as well as other terms such as sale or return, reserves, early delivery etc. We know that there have been concerns over having a sole supplier for vaccines for patients aged 65 and over and at this point in the season this is still the case.

However, please read the new guidance from the October meeting of the <u>Joint Committee on Vaccination</u> <u>and Immunisation (JCVI)</u> for more information about new developments. The Buying Group will regularly update their website as more information is released.

B. UPDATE ON TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT FUND

As practices may be aware, the future of the Training and Development Fund has been a concern within LLR over the last few months, with practices and the LMC expressing concerns on the impact this would have on practices if this was withdrawn.

We are pleased to confirm that the LMC has had correspondence from Ian Potter (Head of Primary Care, West Leicestershire CCG) who is leading on this area which state:

"Following review across the 3 CCGs and in discussion with colleagues in general practice, I am pleased to confirm that the courses provided by the Training Department will continue to be delivered during this year



and that we have made a commitment to continue the service into 2019/20."

There will now be further discussions with colleagues across LLR on how the Training and Development Fund is delivered.

C. CHRISTMAS EVE AND NEW YEAR'S EVE SUB-CONTRACTING ARRANGEMENT

The LLR LMC is pleased to confirm that we have agreement from NHSE for practices to take up the subcontracting arrangement on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve from 4.00-6.30pm.

We have recently sent out communication to all practices in LLR regarding the details and costings for this arrangement. This service will cost £100 for the 2 days.

<u>Shared Learning and Issues raised with the LMC this</u> month:

A. <u>Access to Health Records in relation to Police</u> Reports:

LLR LMC has recently received queries in relation to Police rights to access Health Records.

The BMA offers full guidance on this matter which can be found on their website.

Their guidance does state that:

"If the police do not have a court order or warrant, they may ask for a patient's health records to be disclosed voluntarily under section 35 of the DPA 2018. However, while health professional has the power to disclose the records to the police, there is no obligation to do so.

In such cases, health professionals may only disclose information where the patient has given consent or there in an overriding public interest."

B. <u>Withholding Patient Medical Records:</u>

Recently, practices have received requests to share patient's mental health records and they are seeking clarity on whether they can withhold this information based on the patient's current mental health state.



The ICO provides guidance on this, which states:

For the purposes of the act, 'prejudice' means causing harm in some way. Many of the exemptions listed below apply if disclosing the information you hold would harm the interests covered by the exemption. In the same way, confirming or denying whether you have the information can also cause prejudice. Deciding whether disclosure would cause prejudice is called the prejudice test.

To decide whether disclosure (or confirmation/denial) would cause prejudice:

You must be able to identify a negative consequence of the disclosure (or confirmation/denial), and this negative consequence must be significant (more than trivial); you must be able to show a link between the disclosure (or confirmation/denial) and the negative consequences, showing how one would cause the other; and there must be at least a real possibility of the negative consequences happening, even if you can't say it is more likely than *not*.

The view of the LLR LMC is that if the data controller believes releasing the patient records is going to be detrimental to patient's health, then they can withhold the information in the best interest of patients. The practice might wish to add a disclaimer which states that information that might be considered detrimental to the health of persons would be withheld.

NATIONAL:

L. PREMISES SURVEY

The BMA are currently participating in a review of the GP premises system, which is being led by NHS England and the Department of Health and Social Care. A 'Call for Solutions', seeking input from interested parties for ways in which the GP premises system could be altered to address issues in the system, was recently undertaken with a wide range of proposals submitted for

consideration, and detailed assessment of proposals drawn from this is currently underway.

To help inform this process and the continuing discussions with NHS England and other key stakeholders, the BMA are running a premises survey to build a fuller picture of the current landscape for GP premises.

Winter indemnity scheme

The winter indemnity scheme (WIS) will run again from 1 October 2018 to 31 March 2019. Matt Mayer, GPC England's policy lead on workload, has written a blog which will guide you through the WIS, and explain how to access it.

We believe the current arrangements relating to annualisation within the 2015 NHS Pension Scheme are discriminatory and are prepared to take legal action to address this.
